

LITTLE BROTHER TESTIFIES FOR SISTER AT \$5,000 SUIT

Eva Glasser's Father Seeks Damages for Alleged Physical and Mental Injuries Received in Auto Accident.

A tiny mite of humanity, but sprightly and sharp as a tack, mounted the witness stand yesterday in Judge Martin Hughes' court to tell the jury all about the accident that happened to his little sister, Eva Glasser, March 9 last, when it is alleged the automobile of Leonard McNamara and John D. Hoar ran her down.

This diminutive witness was Johnny Glasser and his feet did not reach the floor and he could scarcely see over the top of the court reporter's table in front of his chair. He is only 10 years of age and he was with his sister on their way from the Adams school, when the accident is alleged to have happened. Learned lawyers failed to shake the lad's testimony or confuse him, and he told his story of the affair in a straightforward manner.

Albert Glasser, plaintiff in the suit, is father of Eva. McNamara and

Hoar are the defendants. Nearly all the witnesses for the plaintiff will be children, and a whole row of them sat in the courtroom all afternoon, waiting for the case to begin. Glasser asks \$5,000 damages for the injuries to his little daughter, which are claimed to be serious and permanent, both physical and mental in nature.

The accident is alleged to have happened at the corner of Superior street and Sixteenth avenue West, soon after school had been dismissed, when the little girl had stepped off the pavement into the street. Her brother recited that she was near to him, although he had not left the pavement, when the machine is said to have run over the child. The Glassers reside at 1605 West Michigan street.

The plaintiff is represented by Attorneys S. M. Slonim and McCoy & Hansen, and the defendants by Attorney Hugh J. McClearn.
