Old men, some with flowing beards, neighborhood counsellors and the fathers of the young men who were called, spoke at the meeting. They spoke not of the vacant chairs at home to be left behind, but of the glory of duty.

The speakers referred to the noble cause and of the material result to their race of a victorious war whose end will mean freedom and equality for all. They told of the willingness of those at home to take up the burghs of the ones who are called. In the tone of the speeches conscription was not a burden, but a sacred henor to country and race. The boys were spoken of, not as victims of chance, but heroes of opportunity.

Are Ready to Fight.

There were talks by the young men who have been called. They told of their readiness to go. Many of them had been willing to enlist before, but mothers, anxious not to lose their sons until the necessity came, had pleaded with them to wait, and true to the traditions of their race, they had obeyed.
