

HEBREWS SEND SOLDIERS BOXES

Forty Men of Society Who Have Enlisted Will Receive "Cha- nuka Greetings."

Forty young men of Duluth in national service, who are members of the Duluth Hebrew brotherhood, will receive "Chanuka greetings," the Jewish term for Christmas tidings, in an unusual way this year.

Two hundred members of the association who are "keeping the home fires burning" have arranged a box for each young man, each containing the same assortment, which will be forwarded to reach them about Christmas.

The assortments present an ingenious combination, and among other things contain the following items: Two pairs of socks, one jackknife, a safety razor with 13 additional blades, three handkerchiefs, packet of ten 3-cent stamps, two cans of tobacco, one pipe, two cases of cigarettes and an assortment of candy and chewing gum.

Gives Many Articles.

The Hebrew Brotherhood association has 235 members. It has already furnished its members in the country's service wrist watches, fountain pens, search lights and other useful articles. They are divided between both soldiers and sailors.

The organization was formed in 1915 and is headed by the following officers: Harry Witz, president; David Weinberg, vice president; M. J. Segal, secretary and Charles Levant treasurer.
