LIQUOR SALES FROM SLEIGH HELD ILLEGAL

Morris Zien Found Guilty, Fined \$100 With Alternative of Farm Term. APPEAL NOTICE GIVEN

Charge Whisky Delivered Without Having Previously Received Order from Purchaser.

Morris Zien, part owner of a saloon at 101 West First street, was convicted on a charge of selling liquor without a license in municipal court yesterday in the city's test suit to de-

termine the legality of liquor sales "from the wagon."
The decision of Judge Smallwood brought to an end a series of post-postments in municipal court since the wagon of the same sentence to pay a fine of \$100 or serve \$8 days at the work farm.
