

500 WOMEN IN \$100,000 CAMPAIGN

Work for Red Cross Fund Begins Favorably; Clever Advertising Idea Will Be Aid.

It is to advertise—so say the Red Cross workers in this week's campaign. If advertising is an aid in the ordinary pursuits of business, they contend, why should it not prove effectual in Red Cross which bids fair to be the biggest business in the country?

But an advertisement, to do its best work, should be unusual, and thereby attractive. Duluth's share of the enormous fund to be raised this week is \$100,000.

Hence the installation of a new telephone at Red Cross headquarters with the illuminating number—Melrose 100,000.

At the meeting yesterday morning for the organization of the campaign work, almost 100 women were present, and were assigned to the precincts in which they will work.

Eight men will act as commanders, to report direct to L. U. Young, the organizer of the work by districts and precincts. Forty-nine men named by Mr. Young will be precinct captains and will report, in turn, to their commanders, each commander having certain of the 49 precincts under his jurisdiction. A group of women, usually from two to four women, will work under each precinct captain, and will report to these captains. The workers of each precinct, men and women, will work together as a group, not individually.

The women who registered yesterday morning were asked to get five helpers each, during the day. All of them entered into the work enthusiastically and reported before 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon with from 5 to 10 helpers each. It is probable that 500 women will be working in the campaign by tomorrow.

Surgical Dressings Supervisors Must Register.

Registration at Red Cross headquarters is required of all women who wish to take the instructions which will qualify them as supervisors of surgical dressings work. The following announcement to that effect has been made by Mrs. W. H. Cole, chairman of the committee on surgical dressings:

"All women who wish to enter the training class to qualify as supervisors over the Red Cross circles making surgical dressings are requested to register at Red Cross headquarters at once. Mrs. C. S. Wilson, who took the prescribed course of training at Washington will have charge of the instructions. The supervisory work will require two or three days each week.

"All circle heads are requested to register at headquarters for work."
