Forty-seven men enlisted in vari-ous branches of service for Uncle Sam yesterday. This brings the total recruiting in Duluth to more than 200 since last Monday.

Married men will be accepted in the forestry engineering regiment of the regular army if they have no one dependent upon them, accord-ing to a telegram received here by Capt. Ned M. Green, in charge of the local recruiting offices. All the men enlisted in this branch of serv-ice are sent to Fort Leavenworth, Kan.

Although the Third Infantry com-panies are above their war strength one company is still shy 32 men. Company A has 118 men enlisted up-to-date and its required quota is 150. All the other companies are above their required quotas.

About 300 "housewife kits" have been completed by members of the soldiers' comfort committee and are ready to be given to the National Guardsmen when they leave for Deming, N. M.

A kit is made out of khaki and contains needles, thread, pins, safety pins, scissors and buttons.

Twenty-eight men who have en-listed in the Serbian army left for New York last night and on reaching that place will go into training pre-liminary to entering the allied armies at Mesopotamia.

A total of 21 men have been re-cruited for the United States marine corps during this month. The local office's quota for the entire month is 25 men and Sergt. Frank J. Buck believes that the number will be passed.
