

REGISTRATION OF ALIENS BEGINS AT VIRGINIA TODAY

**Between 4000 and 7000 Names
Believed Will Be Recorded.
Many Volunteers to Aid.**

VIRGINIA, Feb. 24.—Monday will be a busy day at the city hall building with the beginning of the registration of all aliens, and before the enrollment of non-citizens is completed, it is expected that several thousand names will be registered.

Many Will Help.

It will be no little task to certify all aliens and the interest of the police department will be necessary if every foreigner is to be catalogued. Many volunteers have offered their services in aiding City Clerk A. E. Bickford in the work. The names of some of the volunteers follow: U. G. Holloway, T. M. Williams, D. D. It is believed there will be between 4,000 and 7,000 registrants.

Must Give Up Weapons.

With America in the world war, decrees were issued that all aliens would have to give up their weapons. The sheriff's office was made the receiver for the instruments of combat, and it is significant that but a small part of the known large number of arms possessed by foreigners was turned in. Virginia police, under Chief Owen Gately, and with the cooperation of Game Warden George E. Wood, are now making a drive for the weapons which have not been reported. The registration questionnaires are expected to yield the hiding places of a great many more.
