THE GREAT CANTOR.

Rev. Josef Rosenblatt, tenor, is today one of the most remarkable figures in the concert field. Gifted with a voice whose natural beauty and wide range border on the marvellous, he established himself as a tenor worthy of a first place from his very first recital. Reviews of unusual length and favor were the verdicts of the critics: A completely soldout house was the verdict of the public.

Six years ago Rev. Rosenblatt came to Expert Chicago Auto Radiator Repair-New York at the call of his present congregation. Previous to that time, he had been cantor of several large synagogues in Europe. In his native city in Russia and when only a very young man he be-came known as one of the youngest cantors in the world. Both abroad and in New York his fame as the possessor of an extraordinarily beautiful tenor voice and remarkable art soon spread, though few knew that outside of purely sacred music, Rev. Rosenblatt had acquired an extensive repertoire, including the arias of the great operas and the folk songs of many countries, each in the original tongue.

Mrs. Lowenthal Wins Silver Set.


