DULUTH PROTESTS AGAINST POLISH POGROMS.

The largest meeting ever held in Duluth for a Jewish cause took place at the Odd Fellows Hall last Sunday evening. It was arranged jointly by the Jewish and the Polish Committees and prominent speakers deplored the violence against the Jews in Poland, and adopted resolutions calling for investigation

of the pogroms, punishment of the guilty and writing in guarantees of Jewish liberties in the Polish con-Rabbi M. Lefkovits stitution. presided. The speakers included Bishop Morrison, Rev. Ingham, Lieut. Osanna, just returned from overseas, Rabbi C. David Matt of Minneapolis, and Mr. Solomon Bublick. Rev. Auerbach, the Duluth cantor, recited the "El Mole Rachamin," and Mrs. Tatelman sang "Eli Eli Lama Azavtani." The meeting was attended by some twenty-five hundred people, about equally divided between Jews and Gentiles, and is regarded as one of the most earnest and thought-compelling the city ever witnessed. The local papers commented on the proceedings most favorably.

SUPERIOR HOLDS PROTEST MEETING.

Monday evening a notable meeting was held in Superior, Wis., to protest against the pogroms in Poland. The meeting held in Tower Hall was especially well attended, and is regarded as the most successful Jewish meeting ever held in the city. The speakers included Rev. Friedman, a Maggid who happened to be in town, Judge S. L. Perrin, Rev. D. B. Cheney, H. W. Dietrich, of Superior; Lieut. Osanna, of Duluth, and Rabbi C. David Matt of Minneapolis. Rev. H. L. Chazin rendered the El Mole Rachamin, and Mrs. Tatelman sang "Eli Eli Lamah Azavtani." than seven hundred men and women, Jews and non-Jews attended, and listened with earnest appreciation to the splendid addresses.

The United Hebrew Charities, of Philadelphia, Pa., have just held their 50th annual meeting. Last year's receipts were \$119,785.59; of this amount \$39,500 was borrowed from the treasurer. Disbursements amounted to \$118,314.94; of this amount \$46.500 was repaid to the treasurer. \$52,835.15 was expended in actual relief. Four hundred and fifty-four families were assisted during the year.

The New York Guild for the Jewish Blind has purchased for a home forty-two lots in Yonkers, bounded by Jerome avenue. Vernon place, Park place and Orient avenue. The mansion on the property will be remodeled and the total expense will be about \$100,000.
