



GOOD MORNING JUDGE!

A tragedy in which Albert Kunellus appears to have narrowly escaped being the victim was averted yesterday by the timely appearance of Gilbert Hoel, deputy sheriff, according to a complaint signed by Kunellus which charges Heary Wilita with threatening to kill him with a gun. Two men were doing the pursuing and pursued act in a swamp near Brookston when Deputy Hoel happened along in an auto. The cries of the pursued caused him to investigate, he said. Wilita is out on \$300 bail, and will be tried Friday for alleged breach of the peace.

A peculiar stride and a general makeup which, Detective John Roberg charges, reminded him of a certain corn salve advertisement, were the means of recognizing Ed, alias Adolph, Larson, charged with burglary, whom he arrested at the Bethel hotel in Superior yesterday. Larson appeared before Judge Richard M. Funck yesterday and, waiving examination, was committed to the county jail to await the action of the grand jury. He is alleged to have smashed a plate glass window at the

store of Harry Vertelney, 269 South First avenue East and stealing two pairs of shoes, which were later discovered in a pawnshop.

Two cases of alleged nonsupport were on the calendar yesterday. William Schumann was dismissed at the request of George McCarthy, assistant city attorney. The case of Edward Groat, facing the same charge, was postponed until Jan. 24. He is out on \$100 bail.

Calvin A. Deming, charged with issuing a check without sufficient funds to cover payment will appear before the next grand jury. He was released on \$300 bail.

Nicholas Mertz and Edward Dentinger were arraigned for attempted forgery in the second degree. They are alleged to have asked Arthur Levant, 516 West Superior street, to cash a valueless check for \$15, drawn on the Northern National bank and signed by a fictitious "Joe Berry." Both men waived examination and were committed to await the action of the grand jury. Bail was set at \$500 for each.
