

AIRPLANE FLIGHT FROM TWIN CITIES HALTED BY COLD

The second airplane flight from Minneapolis to Duluth was delayed yesterday by extreme cold and high winds prevailing between Duluth and the Twin Cities. Lieutenant Larrabee, who was to have made the flight yesterday, expressed himself as willing to attempt the trip in spite of conditions. But officials of the Leo Shapiro company for whom he was to make the journey, decided that it was best to wait for more favorable weather.

Lieutenant Larrabee will install a new motor in his machine before making the start for Duluth. A defective cylinder resulted in a narrow escape from death when the aviator was flying recently over Lake Harriet in Minneapolis. A non-stop trip will be attempted by Lieutenant Larrabee, also a lowering of the record established by Lieut. Walter Bullock. The aviator will carry a cargo of drugs from Minneapolis to the Northern Drug company of this city. The Leo Shapiro company is the first to use the airplane extensively for commercial purposes.
