

# TENNIS TOURNEY NEARING FINALS; FRAKER BEATEN

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## Sanders of Minneapolis Defeats Duluth Star in Head-of- Lakes Meet.

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A new face loomed onto the horizon in the catalogue of championship possibilities during yesterday's play in the Head of the Lakes tennis tourney when Clarence Sanders of St. Paul, playing a flashy smashing game, stepped into Walter Fraker of Duluth and drove home an easy victory, 6-0, 6-1.

Sanders wielded his racket with the indomitable cunning of a veteran, the flash of a new star. He was never in danger. Fraker fought gamely, but groveled before the bewildering service and returns of Sanders. And Fraker is by no means Duluth's poorest court artist.

Ehlers, Knight and Sanders, the former two of Minneapolis, now appear to have the edge on their competitors in a big field. However, the Duluth entries have not given up hopes and Kieser of Prairie du Chien is not to be scoffed at.

John Washburn, the Duluth lad, forced Kieser to the limit to win, yesterday afternoon. The visitor captured the series, 6-3; 4-6 and 6-3. It was one of the classiest matches of the tourney.

Guthrie took the measure of Banning, 6-2, 6-0, with very little difficulty. Dinwiddie had a little more trouble but defeated Chapman, 6-2, 6-1.

The weather caused a large number of forfeits. They follow: Cohen to Gude; Burr to Fee; Wilk to Bissonnette; Shandeling to Hanson; Poehler to Knight; Small to Ehlers.

The fact that Poehler defaulted to Knight—both men from Minneapolis, deprived followers of what had been anticipated as a great match.

Knight in the morning experienced little difficulty in disposing of S. C. Dick of Duluth, 6-1, 6-0.

Some classy matches are booked for today. Dinwiddie and Ehlers will clash at 10:30 a. m.; Guthrie and Hansen at 5 p. m. and Charles Fraker and Sanders at 11 a. m. This latter match should prove one of the best of the tourney. It will determine just about what chance Sanders has of winning. If the Duluth lad can pull through he stands an excellent chance of copping. A lot of Duluth's farewell hope rests on Charley.
