

PLANE CRASHES INTO FENCE LINED WITH BIG FAIR CROWD

Too Much "Juice" Turned on by Larrabee's Amateur Assistant at Pequot—Other Fair News.

PEQUOT, Sept. 12.—A serious accident was averted here today when Wilbur P. Larrabee, Minneapolis aviator, made his take-off for his flight at the Crow Wing county fair by the coolness of the aviator himself.

A large crowd had gathered in the field lining the fence near the airplane. The aviator instructed Secretary Larson of the fair association, to turn on the juice, while he maneuvered the machine on its own power, heading in the other direction.

Larson, ambitious to do his part, gave the "big bird" altogether too much juice and then failed to turn off when directed. In consequence, the machine made a head-on dive for the fence, lined with people.

Larrabee had partly turned the plane in the other direction, and noticing Larson's confusion, sprang to the mechanism and turned off the current, but not until his biplane had smashed into the wire fence and badly damaged one of the wings.

It was Brainerd day at the fair. In returning to Brainerd, Larrabee made the 25 miles in 12 minutes, landing in a field near the F. H. Gruenhagen farm. He was the guest of the Brainerd Chamber of Commerce. Friday afternoon he left for Duluth and Superior, where he will give exhibition flights, later fulfilling engagements in upper Wisconsin and Michigan.
