POLISH FAMILY TELLS STORY OF WAR HARDSHIPS

**Duluthian Is Reunited With Wife
and Children After Anxious
Years of Separation.**

After suffering all the privations to which inhabitants of Polish-Russia have been subject since the beginning of the war in 1914, Mrs. Jacob Crystal and her two children arrived in Duluth yesterday from Warsaw, Russia in company with her husband, who went to Europe in January to bring them to Duluth.

The members of the united family are delighted to be in the United States once more, and can only shrug their shoulders and sigh, as they attempt to describe conditions in Poland as they have been since the withdrawal of Russia from the war and the subsequent invasions by the Bolsheviks and Germans.

Conditions Are Bad.

"Poland is in bad shape," they say. "There is little food, practically no clothing, no fuel, and the soldiers everywhere are ready to confiscate what one contrives to obtain."

Mr. Crystal has been in Duluth for eight years, and has a business at 6 West First street. He left for Poland Jan. 25.
