

VIRGINIA'S ALLEGED BURGLAR ENTERS HIS PLEA OF GUILTY

VIRGINIA, Sept. 13.—George Couchy, alias Philip Martin, arrested early this morning by Assistant Chief of Police Charles Gromberg, pleaded guilty in municipal court today to a charge of burglary, first degree. Formal complaint against Couchy was made by S. S. Dahl, attorney, whose home was among those said to have been entered by Couchy.

Couchy was arrested at Third avenue and Eighth street. He had in his possession, it is alleged, a 38-caliber revolver, a screw driver, a pair of pliers and a flashlight. He is said to have made the statement that his Virginia burglaries had been the first he had ever perpetrated alone, although he had worked with a Hibbing burglar recently.

The arrest was made following the burglary of the following homes: J. J. Adrihan, 714 South Fifth avenue West; A. B. Coates, 517 South Fifth avenue; Sam Drasin, 707 Third street South; Dr. O. R. Wood, 520 South Fifth avenue; Gust Simon, 618 Fifth avenue West; Captain Sincok, 1025 South Fifth avenue; Carl Shapiro, 510 South Seventh street. At 502 South Seventh street, screens on doors of the home of County attorney E. L. Boyle and Nick Martin were removed without entering.

The following were arraigned before Judge Lafayette Bliss in municipal court this morning, charged with drunkenness: Tony Tissel, Victor Jackson, James W. Frost and Matt Teleha. The usual penalty of \$10 and costs was assessed in each case.
