Mail Fraud Charge Draws Jail Sentence HOLM GIVEN FOUR MONTHS TERM ON PLEA OF GUILTY

Duluth Man. Charles A. Holm, of Duluth, alias Vernon Casper, alias James W. Wilson. slias Arthur H. Fulton, pleaded guilty to a charge of having used the mails to defraud when arraigned in federal court yesterday morning. He was sentenced to four months in the county iil. It was charged that Holm at-

tempted to defraud mail order houses in Minneapolis and Chicago through a complicated method of sending money orders, bank drafts and checks. Light Fine Given Hyman Benesovitz as found guilty of a chage of violating a United States statute by using the mails to send ciculars advertising punch boards, by s jury which deliberated seven hours. He was fined \$10. Judge Morris advised attorneys for Benesovitz to take an appeal to the circuit court of anpeals on the matter, to decide defin-

itely the legality of sending such cir-

culars. Bonds Forfelted. Bonds of eight men, totaling \$7.000 were ordered forfeited by Judge Page Morris when the men failed to appear to plead indictments returned against them by the federal grand jury. In virtually all of these cases, the bonds had been furnished by friends of the defendants.

New Trial Sought. Walter F. Dacey, attorney for the three Lessard brothers and two others found guilty by a federal jury of conspiracy to transport whisky into the United States, will argue a motion for a new trial this morning before Judge Page Morris. The trial of these men attracted considerable attention. as it was one of the most important cases tried at this term of federal court. They have not yet been sentenced.
