

Duluth Law Student Endures Hardships on Mountain Trip

After he had been lost in the deep snows of Mount Washington for over two days, Emanuel P. Cook, son of Mr. and Mrs. Moses Cook, 2415 East Fourth street, and a student in the Harvard law school, returned to the base station of the mountain railroad last night suffering from exposure and lack of food. In his company were M. Goldberg of Chicago and Benjamin Scheinman of Detroit, two other Harvard students.

The three, according to a dispatch received in the city last night, went on a snowshoe trip last Wednesday morning, making their ascent at Brettonwood, N. H. They had planned to make a one-day tramp and carried only a small food supply. A companion, who turned back at the foot of the mountain said the students had started up the mountainside in the snow and intended to climb to the top, take luncheon, rest there, and return. When the party failed to return early yesterday, fear regarding their safety was expressed by mountain guides, who administered first aid when the trio made their descent at the base station at Fabayn, N. H. The condition of the three is not regarded as serious.

Cook graduated from the Central high school with the class of 1917. He attended the University of Minnesota up until last year when he entered Harvard.
