

"OLD MAN JAZZ" DISCOVERED

MESSRS. PEP AND BEER PALS

Jazz and Beer will be available in Superior this year, according to the 1921 directory published yesterday, along with 558 Johnsons, 228 Olsons, 152 Carlsons, 152 Smiths, and 30 members of the tribe of Jones. The thirty-fourth annual directory contains 11,134 names as well as 13 asylums, hospitals and homes, 7 cemeteries, 11 clubs, 32 schools and colleges, and a United States senator.

The jazz is represented by Joseph Jazyinski. Carl Beer represents the liquor interests. Bartenders and 60 shift drink parlors uphold the constitution and the eighteenth amendment.

Violent Color Scheme.

Forty-seven Willsons, eight Hardings, one Coolidge, two John Hancock, eight Hoovers, a Washington, and a Nightingale recall well known personages. A poetic combination is revealed by the information that Agnes Emerson is a teacher at the Bryant school.

Lucy White, Charles Black, Archibald Gray and Albert Green, add color to the directory. Charles West furnishes the direction for any attorney to A. Hubert Fee to blow a Henry Horn that will make Earl Dodge to escape Frank Fitz and enjoy Phil Singer who is Frank Divine on Casey Day. In addition Electa Ross, Cornelius F. Ronanyne, and 50 cents worth

of "Nichols," the directory boasts fuel in the personage of Arthur Wood, fruit represented by Paul Peach, flowers by Earl Rose, and "chickens" by Charles, Peacock.

Zissos, Zimba, Zingz, Zapp.

Michael Xanthis and Gust Xinos furnish the only excuse for a division of names beginning with "X." The directory contains more "Micks" from McAllister to McTaggart, than there are Johnsons. The "Micks" number 608. Writers of high school yells can find inspiration in Zissos, Zingg, Zimba and Zapp. The last name in the book is that of Ignatius Zygmunt; the first, George Aakenes.

The phenomena in the classified section credits Superior with seven artists, one "acres," eight banks, four baths (for 40,000 people), 43 boarding and lodging houses (how do they all squeeze in?) two corsets (?), two cut flowers, one cheese manufacturer, two "wholesale fish," (J. A. Pearson and I. L. Pomush), one carriage painter, and two "electric washers." The Badgers in Superior move often enough to keep 31 express companies busy. The babies' tastes are catered to by 20 dairies.

Superior can boast a "Cy Perkins," lawyer, 1223 John avenue. The directory lacks any reference to vim, vigor or vitality, and the nearest approach to "pep" is Theodore Petpper.
