

Superior to Recount Ballots in Goldberg, Dorf Election Fiasco

The Superior commission will official canvass the votes of the spring election at their regular meeting at 11 o'clock this morning. A meeting held yesterday afternoon in the council rooms of the city commission for the purpose of establishing the real victor in the recent race between Jake Goldberg and Isadore Dorf for the position of supervisor from the Fourth ward was postponed because of the absence of Commissioner Fred Tomlinson.

John A. Cadigan, attorney for Goldberg, contends that his client was elected because a voter put for Dorf, a cross in the space reading, "Supervisor, vote for one." The election board and the city commission at a meeting a week ago, decided that the vote should be counted in favor of Dorf, as his name was the closest to the line on which the voter had placed his mark.

Cadigan appeared at the conference

yesterday, bearing a volume of the decisions of the state supreme court, similar to the case of the contest between Dorf and Goldberg. The decision rendered in the case did not give the vote to the man having his name closest to the mark placed by the voter in the extra space allowed on the ballot for the voter to write in a name. Cadigan contends that the two cases are similar and that Goldberg is the duly elected supervisor if the vote is not counted. The two

candidates for supervisor were tied, by the decision of the election board and the city commission, at 153 each.
