

CARY GIVEN JOLT IN STATE RACE FOR SCHOOL JOB

Results for Supervisors Close; Dorf Beats Goldberg by One Vote.

Superior had one of the quietest elections in the history of the city yesterday. There were only six offices in the city contest. The total ballots cast in the election was less than 3,000.

The contest for state superintendent of schools was close on returns received up to a late hour last night. John Callahan was leading by 76 votes, over C. P. Cary the present incumbent, with three precincts to be heard from.

Every ward and precinct gave Judge F. S. Parker unopposed candidate for municipal judge, the greatest number of votes cast in the election. A. J. Vinje, was elected judge of supreme court without contest.

Contests Close.

The election of a supervisor for the fourth ward caused considerable interest. Isadore Dorf was returned winner on the first count over Jake Goldberg by one vote, 154 to 153. David E. Holmberg was returned the winner over John Bradshaw and George Hanson in the third ward. John Rehnstrand, the present supervisor from the Fifth ward won over Arnt Berg, 316 to 134. In the Seventh ward James Doland beat Martin McLean, 304 to 263. Frank J. Kenyon of the South End won over C. E. Howard and John Anderson. The count stood, Kenyon 181, Anderson 107, and Howard 91. Joseph Megawa was returned the victor of the Tenth ward over F. J. Idzirek and John Hallam.

The women voters were as numerous as the men, according to members of the election boards. Where there was competition for the election of a supervisor the vote was heavy. In other wards the turnout was small.

Three constables were elected without opposition. Richard M. Dwyer, Louis S. Gotchier, and W. O. Streeter. Of the returns received Streeter led with 823 votes with Dwyer a close second with 771 and Gotchier third with 693.

French, Ritchie, Win.

James B. French and James S. Ritchie were elected as justices of peace without opposition. French obtained the largest number of votes cast.

The following supervisors were elected without opposition: John Bardon of the First ward; William Hagreen of the Second; Alex McKenzie of the Sixth and Gus Adlphson of the Ninth ward.

Vera Rehnstrand was elected county superintendent of schools without opposition.
