## Gambling Cases Continued.

The cases against Charles Rust, charged with keeping a gambling device, and William Ware, Arle R. Easley and Charles Lundstrom, charged with gambling, were continued to this morning for trial.

## Divorce Suit Filed.

Marle Miller, age 29, filed suit for divorce in district court yesterday against Constantine Miller, age 28, charging desertion. They were married June 9, 1913, and she charged the defendant left March 16, 1916. They are the parents of one child.

## Collar Thief Pleads Guilty.

Harry Young, implicated in the theft of 64 dozen collars from the Oak Hall clothing store June 6, pleaded guilty before Judge H. A. Dancer in district court yesterday. A six months' work farm sentence was suspended. Walter Young, his brother, alleged leader in the theft, is serving a six months' sentence at the workfarm.

## Pays \$7 Fine.

Everett C. Stirwalt paid a \$7 fine in municipal court yesterday when found guilty of driving an automobile past open street car gates.

## Held to Grand Jury.

Andrew Anderson, charged with escaping from an officer, was examined yesterday and ordered held to the grand jury. Bail was fixed at \$500. Anderson is alleged to have escaped from the work farm.

## Jury Awards Damages.

A jury verdict of \$5,000 was awarded William Griffith Jones yesterday in Judge H. A. Dancer's division of district court in his suit against the United States railroad administration. Jones claimed a hammer blow on the hand Jan. 16, 1920, while he was in employ of the Northern Pacific railway, resulted in neuritis and asked \$20,000 damages.

## Not Guilty, Plea.

Howard D. Porter, charged with selling intoxicating liquor, pleaded not guilty in municipal court yesterday. His trial will be held Aug. 9.

## Produce Company Fined.

Assistant City Attorney H. E. Weinberg yesterday obtained a conviction against John Morrell & Co., charged with selling butter containing more than the maximum of 16 per cent butter fat, stipulated by law. A fine of \$17, including court costs was paid by the company. M. M. Gasser & Co., charged with the same offense, was acquitted.

## Ex-Patrolman Arraigned.

William David Axelrude, former West Duluth patrolman, arrested Tuesday on complaint of officials at Plymouth, Mich., charging him with

being a fugitive, was arraigned in municipal court yesterday. His examination will be held Tuesday at 2 p. m. Bail was fixed at \$1,000. Axelrude is wanted at Plymouth, Wis., on a charge of breaking into and entering a business establishment.

## Legal Opinion Sought.

The letter of Culver post members of the G. A. R. to the county courthouse commission protesting the appointment of Mrs. A. H. Little, daughter of Asa Dalley, as custodian of Memorial hall has been referred to C. E. Adams, special county counsel, for opinion. The Culver post members request the appointment of J. H. Neil, civil war veteran, to the position, basing their stand on the state soldiers' preference law in public positions.
