This little lady is only ten years old and a product of Minneapolis. Her teacher, Miss Violet Turnbull Lyon, presented her in recital at Studio Hall Monday evening before a goodly audience which evidenced its enthusiasm by its splendid reception.

Freda is a pretty and intelligent little lass. She played the works of Beethoven, Chopin, Mendelssohn and other famous composers with a facility of execution that was truly remarkable for one of her age.

The reading of the difficult compositions which she played seemed to have been her own—she being too young to make studies of interpretation, and were in all cases refined and often original and striking. Her power of touch, execution and style of phrasing is well worthy of a much more mature and experienced pianist.

Her technique was good throughout the program, and she displayed remarkable finger dexterity, particularly in the rapid passages, thrills and other embellishments.

Her playing of the Beethoven Sonata Opus 14, No. 1, was with understanding and good control but she was best in the Second Mazurka by Godard. The other numbers were: Minuet in G, Beethoven; Consolation, Mendelssohn; Preludes 1, 3, 6, 7, and 20, Chopin; Spring Showers by Fink; Valse E Flat Major, Durand and C Sharp Minor Prelude, Rachmaninoff, closed the program.

Little Freda has the makings of a piano-virtuoso and may give Minneapolis cause for pride, in the very near future, if she continues at the pace she is going now.

Assisting Freda were Mary Ann Foltz in pianologues, Margaret Louise Hueur, Lucile Hutchins, Lillian May Webber and John Brundrett, in classic dances.—B. H. A.

Their vehicle is a comedy skit laid in a railroad station. Mr. Greene is seen as a dense porter of ebony hue and Miss Parker appears in the role of a fresh chorus girl.

Boasting a triumphant world tour, Emerson and Baldwin offer a juggling act with many novel features and considerable comedy. Buddy Walton, a pretty and charming miss, who was seen at the Seventh street Orpheum earlier in the season, will present Nan Halperin's cycle of character and comedy songs. An act calculated to prove equally pleasing for adults and children will be offered by Kluting's entertainers, including leaping cats and trained rabbits, pigeons, cats and birds.

Bebe Daniels is the screen star in "Nancy from Nowhere," the story of a poor orphan miss who wins the heart of a millionaire. An Aesop's Fable, Topics of the Day and Pathe's Weekly also will be shown.

She attended the University of Minnesota and graduated from the Winona Normal school. She was admitted to practice law by the Supreme Court of Minnesota.
