JEWISH STUDENT AT ANNAPO-LIS INSULTED BY CLASS-MATES

Washington, June 13.—An affront to a Jewish boy among the recent graduates from Annapolis was called to the attention of the Senate today by Senator Sutherland of West Virginia was called that he would be the senate today by Senator Sutherland of West Virginia was consumed that he would be the senate who was the senate ginia, who announced that he would demand a full explanation from the naval authorities.

The incident arose out of the publication of the "Year Book" by the graduating class and the treatment accorded in the book to Leonard Kaplan, one of the graduates. His biography was printed on the last page of the book, the page was left unnumbered and was perforated along the edge, so that other members of the

class who wished to preserve the class history without having his name in it could tear out the page devoted to him without mutilating the book.

Throughout the four years of Kap-lan's term at the naval academy he maintained a very high standing and was very near the head of his class. "But because of his nationality," said Senator Sutherland, "he has been sub-

Senator Sutherland, "he has been subjected to a refinement of cruelty such as has been set forth."

Asked by Senator Pomerene whether the book was published by the class or by the academy authorities, Senator Sutherland said he understood the midshipmen themselves published it, but "that a course of training that will permit such a condition of affairs to exist in one of our government schools and subject a man government schools and subject a man who has maintained such high standing to such treatment, is utterly un-American and cannot be too scathingly condemned."

Senator King said he could not understand how such a book could be issued without the knowledge of the authorities, who must assume responsibility for it.
Sutherland called attention to the

case of several midshipmen who were set back an entire year for some were set back an entire year for some boyish pranks influenced by indulgence in liquor and surely of minor character compared to the offense of those responsible for "stigmatizing the young midshipmen of Jewish birth." Such conduct, he declared, "evidences a spirit which should not be manifested at any institution and certainly not at an institution under the control of the government."
