The Canadian System. "Sir John A. McDonald, a strong federalist and advocate of centralized authority, the then premier of the Canadian government, conceived the idea of a military police force. It neatly fitted into his theory of government and its administration. Parliament, following his recommendation, authorized by law in 1873 the establishment of the Northwest Mounted police. It was sent into the far Northwest simultaneous with the construction of the Canadian Pacific railroad.

"During the building of the railroad, the chief occupation of mounted police was to suppress Indians and strikes. The official report of Inspector Steele of the police contained these very significant words regarding a strike at Golden City in 1885: 'I instructed the men in charge of the detachment to use the severest measures to prevent a cessation of the work of construction.' 

Newark, N. J..June 22-Rrank discussion and the right of workers to select their own representatives was urged by Maj. Frank J. Miller, speaking to the industrial group of the New Jersey state chamber of commerce, at its meeting in this

Maj. Miller was formerly president of the American society mechanical engineers. In his talk to New Jersey business men he said these principles were essential to successful industrial relations:

"Free discussion of terms, such as obtain between buyer and purchasof forbidding another business man to discuss terms with him, and there is no reason why the same should not obtain in his relation toward the workmen. "The right of each side to select

their own representative, just as is done in the business world. It would be absurd fro one business man to say who should represent the other. Why, then, should it be workmen?"


