

Wedding of Miss Paletz Was Very Pretty Affair

The Knights of Columbus ballroom was the scene of a pretty wedding ceremony at 5.30 o'clock Tuesday evening when Miss Sarah Helen Paletz, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. I. P. Paletz became the bride of William Greenberg, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Greenberg of this city.

The first of the party to enter was the bridegroom, accompanied by his brother, Joseph Greenberg of Winnipeg, and as they took their places below an improvised canopy, Miss Hazel Papermaster at the piano, and Aaron Papermaster at the violin, played the wedding march from Lohengrin. In the bride party were the two bridesmaids, Miss Mary Greenberg of Winnipeg and Miss Mary Goldberg of Fargo, who were attired in orchid color taffeta. Beginning at 8:30 o'clock, a reception and dancing party was given, and more than one hundred twenty-five friends and relatives of the young people were in attendance. A four-piece orchestra supplied music during the evening. In the receiving line with the bridal party were the parents of both the bride and bridegroom.
