

CLOSE CO-OPERATION URGED IN COMMUNITIES BY RABBI

Co-operation should be developed and should prevail among residents of every community, Rabbi David Aaronson last night told members of the Hebrew Institute. Rabbi Aaronson, who arrived in Duluth Friday from New York, probably will assume charge of the institute to succeed Rabbi Israel Lebediger, who is to leave for St. Louis next week.

"The general need of the public is to know each other," Rabbi Aaronson said. "The trouble in most of the large cities is that a spirit of friendliness does not prevail among residents of the communities.

"The neighbors do not know each other and therefore cannot help each other in their work. A certain number of people must act as a guide in developing the co-operation between their neighbors.

"To carry out the idea, people should gather at institutes where plans for the betterment and development of the community in question could be discussed. The wrongs could be amicably corrected and a

feeling of friendship would prevail among the people. The moment a person finds the true nature of his neighbor, they come to understand each other better."

Rabbi Aaronson has had considerable experience in the organization of societies of young Jewish people. He formerly was in charge of the largest synagogue at Salt Lake City and is considered the most promising graduate of the Jewish Theological seminary of New York.

Members of Covenant lodge, B'nai B'rith, will give a farewell luncheon for Rabbi Lebediger at Weiner's restaurant Monday noon. Rabbi Lebediger has been an active member of the organization during his two years residence here. Rabbi and Mrs. Lebediger will leave for St. Louis Wednesday.
