

New Citizens Are Urged to Show Obedience to U. S.

New citizens of the United States are better able to appreciate citizenship than those who were born in America, declared Rabbi Alvin Luchs at the naturalization banquet held at Covenant hall last night under the auspices of the Duluth Americanization committee and the E'nai B'rith.

Faith in America and obedience to the law was urged the new citizens by other speakers. Invocation was given by Rabbi Israel Lebendiger and music was furnished by the Duluth Recreational orchestra. Flag raising ceremonies were conducted by two Boy Scouts, while the pledge of allegiance was directed by Homer B. Hursh of the American Legion. Diplomas to the graduates were presented by I. K. Lewis. Ralph Dunning, on behalf of the American Legion, presented flags to the new citizens.

The duty which a jury is expected to give was outlined by Warren E. Greene, county attorney. Judge Bert Fesler presided. A vocal solo by Mrs. H. Y. Josephs and songs by the audience completed the program, which was in charge of H. J. Steel of the Americanization committee and Hugo Freimuth of the E'nai B'rith.
