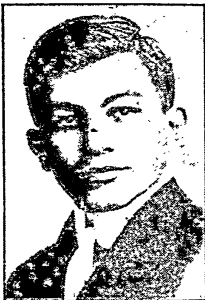


# YOUNG MEN OPEN MUSIC BUNGALOW
