## List of Cast Members Reads Like Page of Social Register

A YEAR OR SO AGO the society editor of a Denver paper announced to her adoring public that in the future she was to keep her office hours at the police court, since the blotter of that respected institution had begun to resemble a page from the social register, and that more of the elite of the town could be found in the prisoner's bench than at the country club. ### The Show.
