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## Mercury Reaches 90.

Yesterday was the second hottest day of the current summer on record in the city engineer's office in the city hall, Superior. At 4:10 p. m. the thermometer registered 90 degrees above zero. A southwest wind began to sweep over the city in the middle of the afternoon sending the mercury on a climbing expedition. The hottest day was June 23, when the thermometer registered 94 degrees.
