THE SENIOR CLASS of the Duluth Central high school, scored a decided success last night when they presented as their class play, Richard Harding Davis' "The Galloper" in the assembly hall of the high school. One of the largest audiences ever assembled to witness a class play was out last night, and the seniors under the direction of Miss Harriet Gemmel acquitted themselves splendidly in the parts assigned to them.

Leading roles were taken by John Bennet, John D. Mitchell and the Misses Ruth Miller, Helen Meinung and Sylvia Josephs. It would be hard to pick the star as they were all very much at home in their roles. The story, wound around the experiences of a newspaper correspondent in Athens during the war between Greece and Turkey, is full of interest, and the love element is furnished by the affairs of the leading characters.

The scenery was more pretentious than that usually seen at high school plays and the costumes were exceptionally well chosen.
