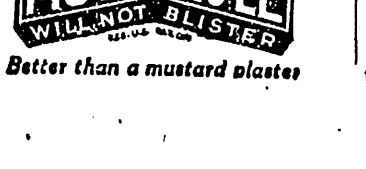

Rabbi Satz spoke following the ceremony, assuring members of his cooperation during the next year and asking them for their support in any issues that may present themselves.

The principal address of the evening was delivered by Attorney Max Meisel, of Cleveland, who is active in philanthropic and civic work in that city. Meisel was formerly district president of the grand lodge of B'nai B'rith and at present is director of the Jewish orphans home in Cleveland.

Meisel based his address on the present campaign for funds to erect a new orphanage in Cleveland Heights and outlined the progress made by workers so far. "An orphanage," Meisel explained, "should not be regarded as an 'institution' where children become automatons. It is, rather, a home where they are cared for sympathetically."

"Out of 4000 graduates of the Cleveland orphanage less than one per cent have become delinquent since they left our care," Meisel pointed out. "And during the last seven years we have not had one death."

At a meeting of graduates of the home last week in Cleveland, \$35,000 was pledged to the million dollar new building campaign, Meisel reported.

Beginning Wednesday Canton workers will start their city-wide canvass for Canton's quota of \$15,000 in the fund. Henry Mann and Sol Toronski are honorary chairmen of the local drive and Attorney Harry Nusbaum will serve as active chairman.

Darwin Luntz served as general chairman of the installation banquet. Following dinner a program was given which included several vaudeville acts from the Palace theater. A dramatic recitation "Leah, the Forsaken," was given by Miss Henkin, of Youngstown.

CARRIES CASE TO UPPER COURT

Suit Against Diebold Company Taken Before Supreme Bench.

Smith had sued the Diebold company to recover a balance due on lumber he sold to the company and a judgment in his favor was given in Stark county common pleas court. The court of appeals reversed it and Smith now seeks a reversal of the court of appeals in the supreme court.
