Craft Searching for Bismarck Aviator Forced Down by Lack of Fuel

Washington, Feb. 14.—(#)—J. T. Trippe, president of Pan-American Airways, telephoned the Associated Press this morning that he had received a radio message from the Amphibian Sikorsky plane, missing since it left Miami yesterday morning, and that the crew and plane

Mr. Trippe said he received his message at 5:11 o'clock this morning and that it came from Floyd S. Whalton, mechanic on the plane. Whalton reported that the airplane was forced down when it ran out of gas and that it floated to Red Bay at the north end of Andros Island. Whalton procured a boat there and went to Nassau where he sent his ige. The plane left Miami to aid in the search for the plane of Stephen Calloway; who was after-wards found by a passing ferry boat.

The Sikorsky was piloted by Harry Rogers and besides Whalton, Raiph Dalstrom, assistant pilot and J. Angus, mechanic.
