Supreme Bench Expected to Make Quick Decision on **Validity of Jury Action**

DWIGHT HEARD, DIES

Cattle Man, Cotton Grower Banker and Booster Was Roosevelt Follower

Phoenix, Ariz., March 15—(P)— Dwight B. Heard, publisher of the Arizona Republican, died at his home last night. Death followed a heart

If there existed such a title as champion of and for Arizona, it might have been given to Dwight Bancroft Heard without dispute. Although been nearly as far away from that state as was possible in the United States, he was, from about the age of 25, one of its most enthusiastic boosters. His name was connected with practically every project looking toward the advancement of Arizona.

Going to Arizona as a young man primarily to restore his failing health, in which he was successful, he eventually became a cattle man, cotton grower, banker and publisher. He was a close student of reclamation and irrigation projects and was recognized as an authority on those subjects. During 1907 and 1908 Mr. Heard devoted much of his time as one of the leaders in opposition to joint statehood was chairman of a committee of 30 citizens of Arizona who went to Washington to actively protest against the proposed joint statehood and to insist upon separate admission of Arizona as a state. He also served by appointment of the legislature as one of the Arizona commission to oppose the Swing-Johnson Boulder Dam bill in Washington in 1927. In 1912 Mr. Heard was one of the 53 who signed the call for the Pro-


