

A good deal of water can get thru very small leak in a water pipe in a short time, and it is well to know how to stop a leak in emergencies. Put a flat rubber or leather gasket over the leak and hammer a stiff piece of metal, such as a picture hook, to fit over the gasket. Secure both to the pipe with a vise or clamp. A small leak under low pressure can sometimes be stopped by embedding the pipe in rich Portland cement mortar or concrete. It is necessary to shut off the water from the pipe and build a boxing around it to hold the soft mortar closely against the pipe. Brokon swer pipe can be repaired in the same way. A wrapping of wire net-ting embedded in the mortar or concrete will increase its strength.
