A short distance away they also found the floating body of a man, This was on Thursday of last week. The party came to the city and enlisted the services of others and soon the body was

From a diary in the duffle of the unfortunate men it was learned that they were Edwin Jackman, aged 35 and Lester Lockwitz aged 23, of Kenosha and Kiel, Wisconsin. The diary further disclosed that the men started on a cance trip on the 28th of July. They were returning and according to indications had made the portage around the rapids where the camped the night of August 7th. Here the diary stopped and the supposition is that in the morning they loaded their cance and by some unaccountable manner became lost, taking the wrong direction, or out of curiosity paddled too near the swift water and were carried to their death.

Undertakers Laing and Helm and Coroner Lomasney were called. The bodies were in a bad way and metal containers were secured for their transportation. The crew which accompanied the above had a desperate time in conveying the bodies to this city. Six men were required on the portages to carry them and these were forced to rest every 300 feet. The party went up Tuesday afternoon and returned late Wednesday night.

The remains were shipped to their homes on Thursday morning. According to the diary the men had the time of their lives up to August 7th when entries stopped. Both leave relatives in their home towns.
