Washington, Dec. 18.-(A)-The export debenture plan was envisioned today by Senator Brookhart of Iowa as a method by which the farmers of the country could gain four billion dollars more a year from their crop

Speaking over the network of the National Broadcasting company, the Iowa senator said five billion dollars more than the amount now received was necessary if the farmer was to get wages for his work equal to those of ordinary, unskilled labor. 
