### MRS. SUOMINEN TO MAKE GOLD STAR MOTHERS TRIP.

According to Quartermaster General B. Frank Cheatham, 6,730 of the 11,440 Gold Star relatives eligible to visit American war cemeteries overseas as guests of Uncle Sam, have accepted the invitation. Most of them will go during 1930. Mrs. Robert Suominen of this city is listed among the number to make the trip.

The pilgrimages include transportation to New York, cabin-class steamship accommodations and two weeks overseas with all expenses, even tips, paid by authority of congress, at the suggestion of the American Legion.

Those looking after the travelers, including the guides, will be selected from the regular army. So far as possible, those going to the same cemetery from each state, will travel together.
