**TRUCK LINE AND RAILROAD CASE HERE AT MARCH TERM.**

Notice of trial on appeal from the decision of the Minnesota railroad and warehouse commission granting the Copher Trunk Lines of Duluth a permit to operate a trunk line between Aurora and Winton, by the Duluth & Iron Range railroad. The railroad commission and S. L. Goldish, head of the truck firm, were served with notices of the appeal. The case is set for hearing March 24 in this city at the regular term of district court.

Following granting of a permit last August to the Gopher concern, the commission issued a stay of order on protest of the railroad. Hearings were held here and at Duluth. On January 3, this year, the state body issued an order reaffirming the original certificate.

The D. & I. R., then filed notice of appeal to the state supreme court, which trial is held at Ely. The truck line is now in operation from Aurora to Tower, Ely and Winton.

## MEETING CITES RECOMMENDATIONS

OPEN MEETING CALLED BY FRANK LOZAR POST ON SHIPSTEAD-NOLAN BILL ATTENDED BY LARGE CROWD OF INTERESTED CITIZENS.

The Legion room at the Community Center was well filled on Monday evening in response to a request sent out by the American Legion post of this city to talk over matters relating to the Shipstead-Nolan and Pittenger bills now before Congress.

Fred Vibert of the Minnesota Power & Light Company was present and spoke of the hearings in Washington which he had attended and also gave the Power Company side of the question. After Mr. Vibert had concluded, a general discussion followed.

Many expressed their opinions. All those speaking seemed to be in favor of the aims of the bill in general but were at variance in regard to the language of the same, the territory embraced and the effects of the bill on industry were it passed without amendments.

After considerable discussion during which views were generally expressed, a vote was taken and it was decided to recommend the committee appointed by the Commercial Club that the territory be restricted to conform to the lines laid down by the citizens of Lake and Cook counties and the committee of sixty which met at St. Paul a year ago and whose recommendations were given the legislature.

It was also decided to stand behind the lines as laid down in the Pittenger bill, viz: north of line 68, east as far as range 3 and west to the Elk and county line after excluding the Cook and Bear River farming territory. It was also decided to recommend the adoption of the amendments made to the bill by the senatorial committee two years ago.

The Duluth Herald in editorially commenting on the Ely meeting had the following to say and which comment states the case exactly as the miners of the district view the agitation was begun by people remote from this section to eventually make a National Park of a vast territory that is destined to play a part in keeping the state in the front rank in mining and timber and keep industry supplied with these necessary resources. The Herald said:

"The citizens of Ely in a mass meeting held night before last, voted to demand that the area covered by the Shipstead-Nolan bill be greatly reduced."

"The reduction proposed is substantially that which every senator and representative from Northern Minnesota except one voted for when this issue was before the legislature a year ago. It is also substantially the area proposed in the Pittenger bill."

"This bill, with the area it affects reduced as the people of Northern Minnesota manifestly wish it to be reduced, would still reach the original purpose of the measure, which was to stop the Backus plans for exploiting the border waters."

"And the reduction in area would free from the stifling effect of the measure a large area which the Arrowhead communities need to have developed and cannot afford to have passed."

"How many people, including many who favor the Shipstead-Nolan bill, realize, for instance, that as it now stands it includes an area of nearly four hundred thousand acres in the Littlefork valley of Northern St. Louis county that is entirely outside of the border watershed, that has utterly nothing to do with the Superior national forest is concerned is adequately protected already?"

"Yet this area includes some of the finest farm land in the state. It covers the districts that support the wonderful farm developments of the Cook and Bear River sections."

"Minnesota may look on complacently while congress puts an embargo upon the development of such areas as this, but Ely cannot, the Mesabian range communities cannot and Duluth cannot."

"If the Shipstead-Nolan bill cannot be amended to reduce its area to that proposed by the people of Ely, then the best interests of the Arrowhead require that it be defeated entirely."

"And if it is defeated, the fault will be with those supporters of the bill who have refused to compromise on the area covers, and who compelled the miners to renege on a plan of this session without the amendments that had been agreed upon at the last session."
