

MOUNTAIN IRON ORE DISCOVERY

MESABE RANGE DISCOVERY OF ORE WILL BE CELEBRATED TOMORROW—ALL RANGE TOWNS TO BE REPRESENTED—PROGRAM ARRANGED.

J. H. Harding, assistant general manager of the Oliver Iron Mining company was named today as master of ceremonies for the celebration at Mountain Iron Saturday commemorating the 40th anniversary of the discovery of iron ore on the range.

Gov. Floyd Olson, who was invited to appear, will be unable to attend, he has advised. He will be represented by George E. Wallace, recently appointed to the state tax commission. The program will open at 2 o'clock in the afternoon with a parade of floats depicting the various stages of mining. The parade will include delegations from Virginia, led by the Virginia municipal band; the drum corps of Hibbing, a delegation from Chisholm and other range towns. The Pioneers of Thirty Years Association, of Virginia, will hold its meeting in conjunction with the observance at Mountain Iron.

Eugene Merritt of Duluth, son of

Lucien Merritt, one of the "Seven Iron Men," who made the original discovery of ore on the Mesabe range, will unveil the boulder, marking the approximate site of the discovery of ore.

Among the day's speakers will be A. P. Cohoe of Bixby, Minn., who has the first man to suggest open pitting; John E. Merritt of Aitkin, one of the first men connected with the Mesabe mountain pit, and J. Adam Bede, who published the first newspaper in Mountain Iron and several others.

An historical pageant depicting scenes in the early days of mining in this vicinity will be presented under the direction of Miss Marjorie Gullikson.

Two banquets are on the program, that of the Engineer's club and the old settlers of Virginia and Hibbing. A program will be given in the auditorium at the close of the Engineer's club banquet. The celebration will close with a dance in the evening at the village hall.



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COOK TO CUSSON GRADING BIDS

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT ALSO CALLS FOR FIGURES ON SEVERAL GRAVEL AND SHOULDER JOBS.

Bids on three trunk highway grading projects and several graveling and shouldering jobs will be received by the Minnesota Highway department June 30, Commissioner C. M. Babcock announced this week. The proposed work will bring the year's grading program to a total of 565.5 miles. With all doubt removed as to the legality of issuing the full amount of bonds authorized by the Legislature, the construction program will proceed as originally planned, and further lettings of grading and other work will be announced at regular intervals during the summer.

One of the proposed jobs is a relocation of T. H. No. 11, between Cook and Cusson, in this county, to hook up with another relocation project previously announced, between Cook and a point 16 miles north of Virginia, on which bids will be received June 16. The two projects together will effect a distance reduction of 4.1 miles, eliminate two grade crossings and several sharp turns besides giving the people on No. 11 north of Virginia the relocation they have been promised for several years and which road will be paved as soon as possible.

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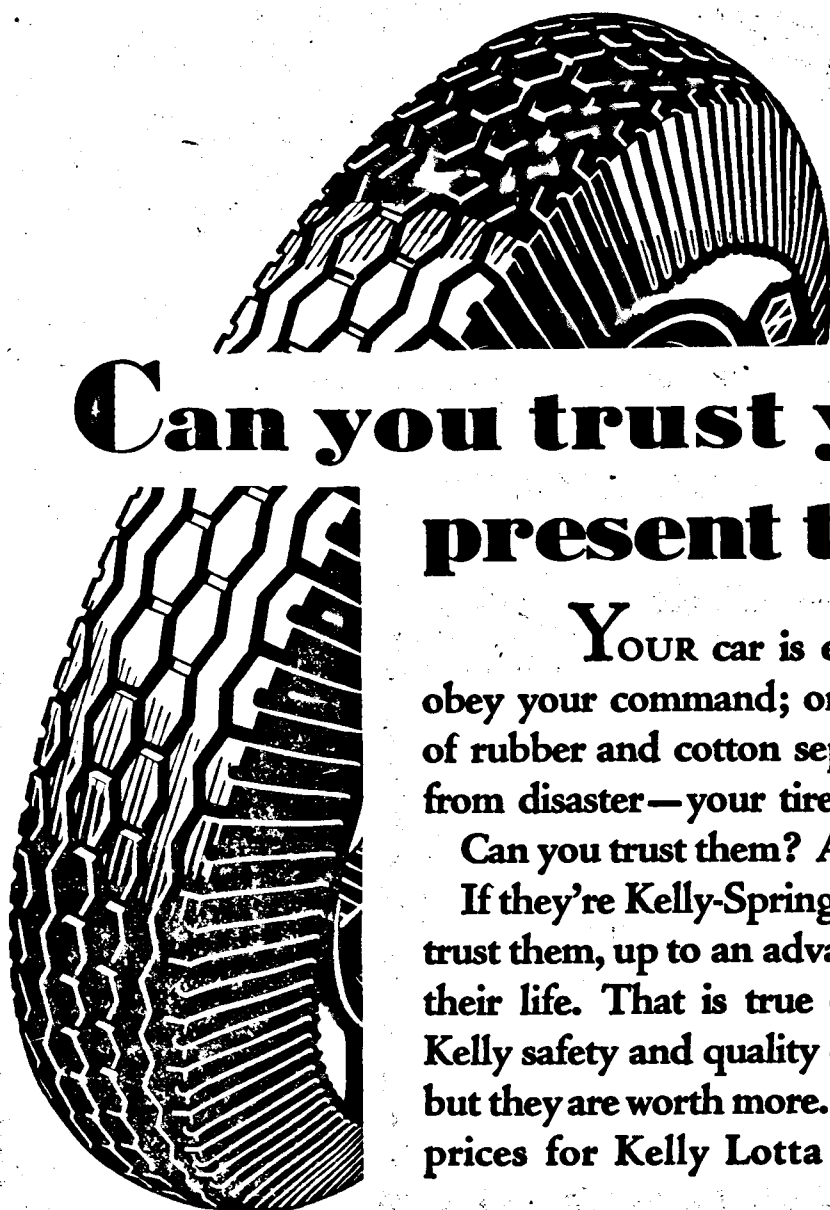
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
