Subsistence Homestead

One of six states in the Union to receive such a grant, Minnesota was swarded two subsistence homestead to be located at Austin, the other near Duluth.

It is planned that members of the homestead groups will be employed on part time basis at industrial plants in the cities and will provide themselves with foodstuffs and agricultural products from their three to five-acre plots.

The cost of a homestead will be approximately \$2,000 to be paid off during a period of 20 years. This cost includes from three to five acres of land, 12 chickens, a cow, a pig, and a comfortable four or five room house. Construction will be started on the homes in the near future.

KNIFE LAKE

Remains of Waino Havila and **Eino Aalto Found Floating** ' Sunday and Monday.

The body of one of the men drowned in Knife Lake on May 14 was found Boating on the afternoon of Sunday by the game wardens who have kept a sharp lookout since dragging was discontinued early last week.

Oscar Ringnel in the Scenic Airways plane took the Virginia party to Knife Lake, a distance of about 40 miles from anchored by the wardens pending the arrival of the coroner. While on the way to where the body had been tied up, the other body was found by Mr. Ringnel and party, also afloat.

The first body was identified as that of Eino Aalto of Virginia and the second as that of Waino Havila of Hutter. the plane and brought to this city on Monday evening and later taken to Memorial Services. Virginia by hearse. Pilot Ringnel informed the Miner that both bodies were in a very bad condition and that identification was made through articles in the pockets of the men.

Eino Asko and Waino Havila with Arvid Johnson were fishing in Knife a high wind. All clung to the boat and tried to propel it to the shore a quarter of a mile away. When within shout 200 feet of their goal, the strength of Asito and Havila gave out in the chilly waters and both sank. Johnson clung to the boat and eventually reached shore.

Knife Lake is a deep body of cold water and there was a remote possibility that the bodies would not be recovered. The crews dragged the lake continuously for two weeks and last week gave up the dragging in the hones that the bodies would come to the surface.
