months.

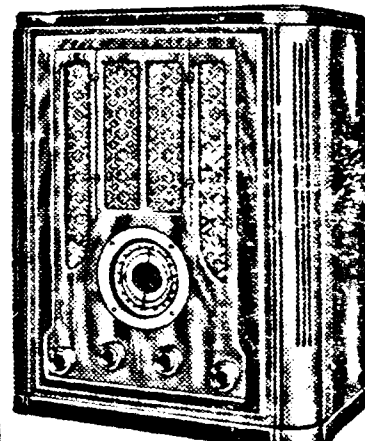
John Hanson, in company with rela-
