

Noted Painter Aids Gov't. in War Against Forest Fires



creational losses that follow in the wake of forest fires that sweep over 40 million acres each year, James Montgomery Flagg, noted painter, has presented to the United States government an original painting as his personal contribution to the cause of fire prevention. the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today.

The painting depicts Uncle Sam in the uniform of a Forest Ranger pointing a finger toward a burning forest, over the title "Your Forests-Your Fault-Your Loss." It was Mr. Flagg's "I Want You," called by the contemporary press "the greatest war cartoon of all time," that established the familiar Flagg "Uncle Sam." More than four million copies of this work were distributed by the government and publications with a circulation of more than ten times that number reproduced it, many in full page size. The original painting now hangs in the Smithsonian Museum in Washington.


