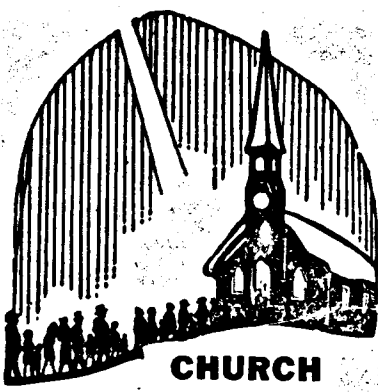

The Ely city baseball team dropped a 4 to 3 seven-inning game to Keewatin on the winner's diamond, Saturday in a game that didn't receive much attention from the hundreds of members of the Moose lodge holding their state convention there or from the residents of Keewatin. In fact the convention was uppermost in the minds of the Keewatin baseball players, for at the end of Ely's half of the seventh, they walked off the field without much more formality than that, according to Manager Ernest Maddern of the Ely club, so as not to miss the parade. And thus the game ended.

Ely's game at International Falls, Sunday, was rained out.

The first run of the game was credited to Ely in the first inning when J. Svigel walked, P. Banks advancing the local second baseman to second on a grounder to the Keewatin second baseman who tossed the ball to first, and M. Banks bringing in the run with a single.

In the third, hits by M. Krall and P. Banks, who later crossed the plate, and B. Maddern, scored two more runs to put Ely ahead, 3 to 0, with the game apparently sewed up.

But in the fourth, Gentile, Ganneral and Spadicinni scored for Keewatin on a hit and a stolen base by Gentile, a walk handed to Ganneral, Spadicinni

False Claims for Benefits Will Bring Prosecution.

Workers who falsely claims to obtain unemployment benefits will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

This warning was issued today by Frank T. Starkey, Industrial Commissioner, in charge of the state unemployment compensation division. He pointed out that the law provides punishment for persons found guilty of falsifying claims, for their own benefit or for the benefit of others, of a maximum fine of \$100 or up to 90 days imprisonment.

"Eligible unemployed workers are being paid benefits to which they are entitled," Commissioner Starkey said, "but persons who sign false statements regarding unemployment or old-job earnings will be prosecuted."

Commissioner Starkey also warned that the division is continuing its practice of obtaining state or federal government criminal action against the forging of stolen checks. Despite the fact that all benefit checks bear the name, address and Social Security Account Number of claimants, merchants have been known to cash such checks.
