Workers who falsify claims to obtain Starkey stated. unemployment benefits will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. This warning was issued today by Frank T. Starkey, Industrial Commisployment compensation division. He pointed out that the law provides punishment for persons found guilty of falsifying claims, for their own benefit mum fine of \$100 or up to 90 days im-

"Eligible unemployed workers are to the lake Wednesday and spent the being paid benefits to which they are entitled," Commissioner Starkey said, "but persons who sign false statements regarding unemployment or odd-job earnings will be prosecuted.
