Clean and joint a 3 pound chicken Dry and season with sait and pepper Roll in flour Fry slowly in half lard and half butter. Keep covered while cooking

Cook without any water until tender Cut up fine when cooked and add 1 tablespoon of gelatin dissolved in a little water Place in hot mould.
