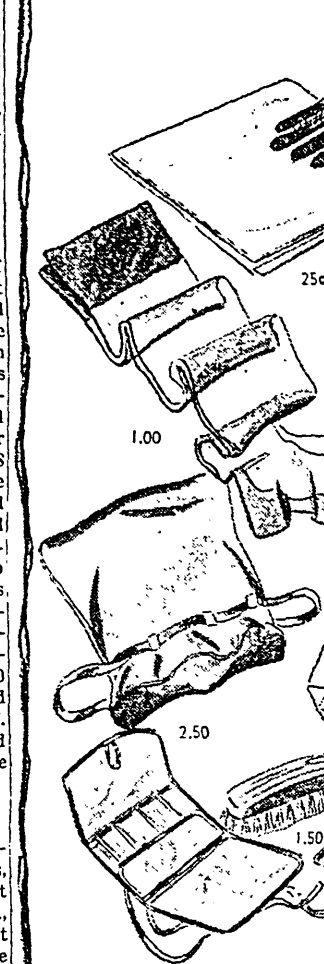
Herman Bosch

State Defense Body to Study Farmer Shortage Problem
Plans for total community mobilization to meet the acute farm labor shortage in Wisconsin will be discussed at a meeting of the farm-labor committee of the Wisconsin Council of Defense Thursday morning, John C. Cudahy, director, said Tuesday.
In calling the meeting, Cudahy pointed out the state's importance as a producer of foods vital to the war effort and said it was estimated not less than 100,000 men have been taken by the armed services from the farms.
The committee will survey the needs of farmers in various parts of the state and will plan the recruiting of non-farm labor, such as high school students on vacation, and place workers where they are most needed.
The committee will co-operate with the U. S. employment serv-

ice and the U. S. department of agriculture, the Wisconsin State Federation of Labor and various state departments and local agencies.
