Mrs. Richard Williams returned Sunday to Chicago after a visit at the Thomas Williams home.

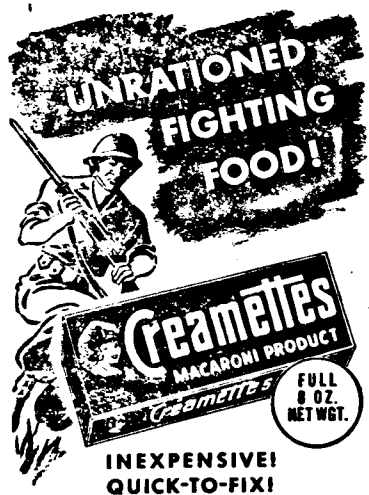
