

How to pick best bishop

Appointment of a new auxiliary bishop to the Chicago archdiocese raises some questions about the process of selecting bishops and about who should be selected.

A check on some reactions to the appointment of Bishop Nevin Hayes as auxiliary to John Cardinal Cody revealed both well-wishing and misgivings.

Bishop Hayes, 49, was ap pointed Tuesday by Pope Paul VI. just as he had been appointed in 1959 to head the church territory of Sicuani, in

The Sicuani area has some 290,000 Catholics living in altitudes ranging from 12,000 to 23,000 feet. Poor health forced Bishop Hayes to resign that He was consecrated a bishop in 1965 in Holy Name Cathe-

dral, Chicago, when Sicuani was made a diocese. THE LAY people of Sicuani

had no say in his choice. Nei-ther did the lay people of the Chicago archdiocese when it came to their getting an auxiliary bishop.
Probably only a few Catho-

lics will object to this procedure, and the Chicago-bornand-bred Bishop Hayes will surely receive the "warm welwished for him this week by Cardinal Cody.

But discontent has been expressed this week and before about this method of picking bishops, by which the recommendation of the apostolic delegate, an Italian living in Washington, makes all the difference.

Nothing serves better to keep the U.S. hierarchy "in the fold" as envisioned by officials of the Roman Curia, observers say, than this power exercised by the delegate.

CARDINAL Cody has asked for and gotten suggestions from his priests (not lay people) as to who among them would make good bishops.

But these suggestions were given in secret, and no public accounting of them is made.

The appointment of Bishop Hayes, a Carmelite, is seen as a gesture of appreciation toward religious-order priests, who comprise about half of those serving the archdiocese.

But some have asked, "What about the distinguished religious-order priests already working in the archdiocese and familiar with its problems?

• ANOTHER question has been raised about the availability of local archdiocesan clergy, especially a younger priest, for the position of auxiliary bishop.

A younger man who could hear out his peers as well as the older priests could help bridge the troubled waters that rock'the churchly boat these days, observers say. Auxiliary bishops generally

help the archbishops in liturgical and ceremonial matters such as administering the sacrament of confirmation matters that multiply beyond one man's time and strength in the biggest archdiocese in the

ANSWERING the question, "why have auxiliaries," some have suggested that they might be given important dele gated powers, such as has occurred in Detroit, to take a great administrative burden from the archbishop.

The Chicago archdiocese is highly centralized when it comes to decision-making in sharp distinction to Detroit. where the chancery office has been virtually abolished.

McGovern builds fund for '72 race

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. George McGovern of South Dakota has made a \$261,000 beginning on the costly business of running for President. He expects to spend about \$500,000 on his Democratic White House quest during 1971.

And that will be the inexpensive part of his campaign: the real money will be needed in 1972 for the presidential primary elections McGovern believes will be decisive.

McGovern's political revenues thus far include \$161,000 in contributions mailed in response to the Jan. 15 letter in which he announced his candidacy, and about \$100,000 in donations and pledges he said he received at the time of his announcement.

THE LETTER, addressed to "My dear friend," went to 275,000 people across the nation. In it, McGovern outlined his background and his views. stressing his opposition to the war in South Vietnam, and sought financial support to "start bringing my case to the same perch," Church asserted, people across the country "would unite the country on a people across the country throughout 1971."
