# **Scientific** \*research called top priority

WASHINGTON - In some areas. the United States has taken some licks from foreign competitors lately. But in scientific research, the foundation for technological progress, the United States is still second to none.

"There's no question that American science is vastly superior to that of any other nation," says George A. Keyworth, science adviser to President



While basic research in America has been forging ahead, says Keyworth, labs have become more and

more isolated.
"Almost a chauvinistic attitude has developed, where the perception is that good, creative science is inconsistent with the profit motive," he says.

This "chasm," says Keyworth. makes it difficult for the country to address the most serious security threats facing the country today: "economic threats from competitors who have become more challenging and the fact that the technological gap between the U.S. and the Soviet Union has been very much reduced."

Changing the way U.S. science is organized may help close this chasm.

But 27 universities and 12 corporations are paying for their instruments to hang on the basic light source so they can conduct their own experiments. IBM is studying ways of etching microchips: New York State University is building a new X-ray microscope.

Keyworth says the Reagan administration is out to draw a clear line where federal government research should stop and private-sector development should begin. Much of the science carried out in the '70s at the **Environmental Protection Agency** (EPA), he says, shows how the government gets involved in areas it should leave alone.

NEW YORK (AP) - Kathy Morris, whose long battle with brain tumors was portrayed in a 1980 CBS television movie called "Seizure: The Story of Kathy Morris," has died at the age of

Miss Morris, who died Friday, began to suffer seizures in 1976 while a senior at the Manhattan School of Music. Doctors told her she had a brain tu-

During an operation that year to relieve the condition, her brain unexpectedly swelled. The surgeon, convinced Miss Morris wouldn't survive the day, didn't complete the operation.

After six weeks in a coma, Miss Morris suddenly responded to a doctor's instruction to squeeze his hand. Since that time she had undergone five brain operations and countless hours of therapy to restore her ability to read and write

The singing voice remained. In 1978, Miss Morris performed her operatic recital in five languages before scores of tearful friends and relauves.

The CBS movie, which starred Pe nelope Milford as Miss Morris and Leonard Nimoy as her doctor, featured Miss Morris in a cameo role at the close of the production singing "It's Good

Today," her own composition. Miss Morris, who had been living in Clifton, N.J., died at Calvary Hospital in the Bronx, where she had been hospitalized since December.

Miss Morris is survived by her brother, Patrick. Her parents died years before their daughter's ordeal began.
